Health Equity Capacity Building Program

<u>Purpose</u>

- To strengthen community-based organizations in Maine that are working to advance health equity and do so with primary leadership from members of the systematically under-resourced communities they serve.
- To provide a foundation for MeHAF and grantees to collectively work toward building a movement for health equity in Maine
- To forge new transformative, healing relationships, both between funder and grantee and across communities.



Health Equity Capacity Building Program

Structure

- Four-year unrestricted grant of \$30,000 per year
- \$5,000 annual budget for capacity-building/technical assistance
- Quarterly convenings
- Grantee-led program design



Eligibility

- > 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization or a tribal government entity based in Maine.
- > Fiscally sponsored applications accepted
- For fiscal sponsorship applications, a conversation is required prior to applying



Health Equity Capacity Building Program Criteria

- 1. An organization *led by and serving* communities that have been systematically under-resourced, including Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC), LGBTQ+ people, people with disabilities, and people experiencing homelessness. When considering this criterion, reviewers will think about:
 - a) Whether the **staff and staff leadership** are members of the community of focus
 - b) Whether the Board and Board leadership are members of the community of focus
 - c) How the organization gathers and acts on *guidance and leadership from the community*, beyond its own Board and staff.



Heath Equity Capacity Building Criteria (continued)

- 2. Organization working to advance health equity for its community. When considering this criterion, reviewers will think about:
 - a) Whether the organization has a primary or major *focus on health issues* faced by its community.
 - b) Whether the organization's programs or activities have an *important impact on health* care access and/or health status for their community.
 - c) Whether the organization's expertise, community trust, leadership and/or other factors make them *able to advance* health equity for the community in ways that other organizations cannot.



Heath Equity Capacity Building Application Process

- Two stage process
- Stage One:
 - LOI
 - Due by Monday, December 9 at 4:00 PM
- Stage Two:
 - Full application (Interview, video, or written)
 - Due by Friday, February 14 at 4:00 PM



Heath Equity Capacity Building Application Process

Stage 1: LOI

- Basic Organizational Info, finalist format preference
- Upload document (2 pages suggested, 5 page maximum)
- Alignment with criteria

Heath Equity Capacity Building Application Process (continued)

- Stage 2: Finalists (up to 14 invited)
 - Option for interview, video, or written submission
 - Continued focus on criteria alignment
 - Additional considerations: capacitybuilding impact, collaborative approach

A Few LOI Tips...

- Review the full required information soon and complete application details
- See existing grantee profiles
- Ask if your organization is well-aligned with the two HECB criteria
- Be succinct & focused
- Ask questions if unsure
